A partial reconstructed census for the destroyed 1790 Census of Virginia has been in print since 1908. These were state censuses of heads of families for the years 1782-1785 for 39 counties. It is published in Heads of Families at the First Census of the United States Taken in the Year 1790.

Congress assigned responsibility for the 1790 census to the marshals of the U.S. judicial districts under an act which, with minor modifications and extensions, governed census taking through 1840. The law required that every household be visited, that completed census schedules be posted in "two of the most public places within [each jurisdiction], there to remain for the inspection of all concerned..."

1790 Overview - History - U.S. Census Bureau

The 1790 census began on 2 August 1790. The marshals were expected to finish the census within nine months of the Census Day by 1 May 1791. Although most of the returns were in long before the deadline, Congress had to extend the count until 1 March 1792. By that time some people probably were counted who had not been born or present in 1790.
